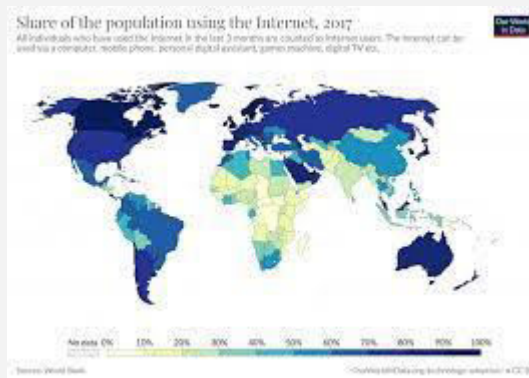

51% of world population (2018)

92% of European population (2021)

- Internet skills
- Netiquette skills
- Search skills
- Navigation skills
- Browsing skills

SUBJECTIVE SKILLS

- Be friendly
- Show interest
- Actively listen
- Be helpful
- Show honest Feelings
- Ask for opinions
- Give compliments
- Don't inside jokes
- Explain your view
- Speak up for others



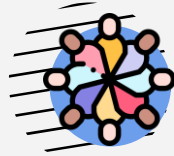


Inclusion

- Inclusion is a critical element of democracy

listening, understanding, accepting
- For many, inclusion is an acquired skill

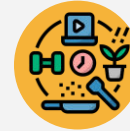

- In today's world, your success in life can depend on whether you have internet access or not
- A limitation would represent a deepening of the poverty trap
- Access to internet as a human right
- Free and equal access for everyone across the globe

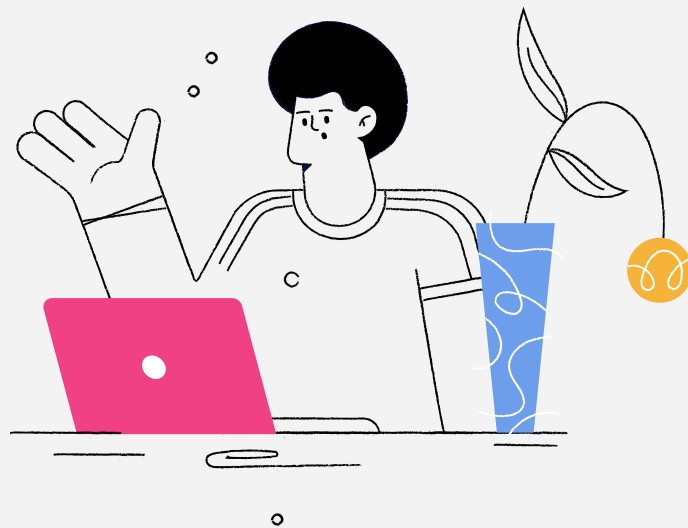
United Nations General Assembly:

5. *Affirms also* the importance of applying a [comprehensive](#) human rights-based approach in providing and in expanding access to Internet and requests all States to make efforts to bridge the many forms of digital divides;









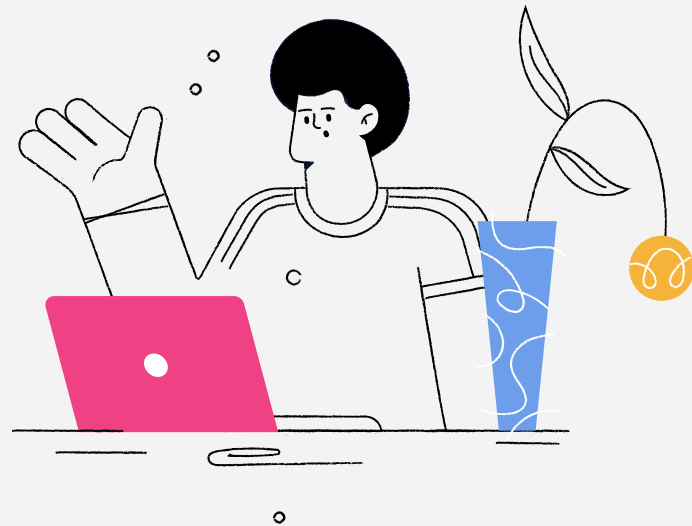
But why is it so important to have access and be included in the digital world?

- tight connection between the physical and the digital worlds – a limitation in the digital world often coincides with one in the physical one as well



Key competence needed to navigate the net

-  Internet skills: the ability to connect to the internet and go online
-  Media skills: the ability to navigate various forms and tool of online content
-  Technical skills: the ability to use the internet and online services in an optimum way
-  Safety skills: the ability to navigate safely the internet and avoid such things as spam and hacking
-  Confidence: the ability to truly represent your thoughts and feeling online
-  Motivation: understanding why access and inclusion is important to all



Case Study

Cornwall's Digital Inclusion Programme

24% of adults in Cornwall lacked basic digital skills (2014)

A support program was implemented, which reached 15,000 adults

- Testimonial SC from Camborne (93) described the course as: "a magnificent glimpse at the extreme possibilities that can open"
- Testimonial MB from Liskeard (45) reported that "a whole new world opened up to me"

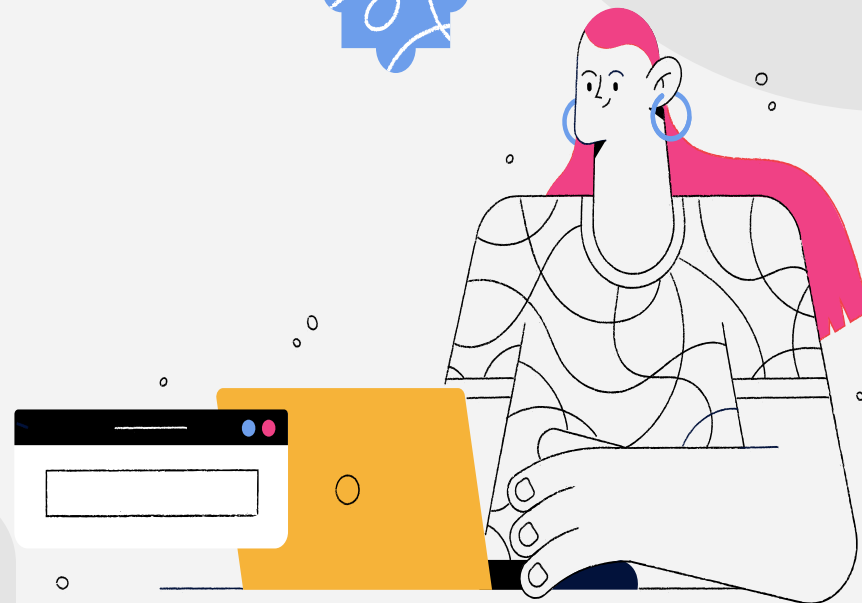

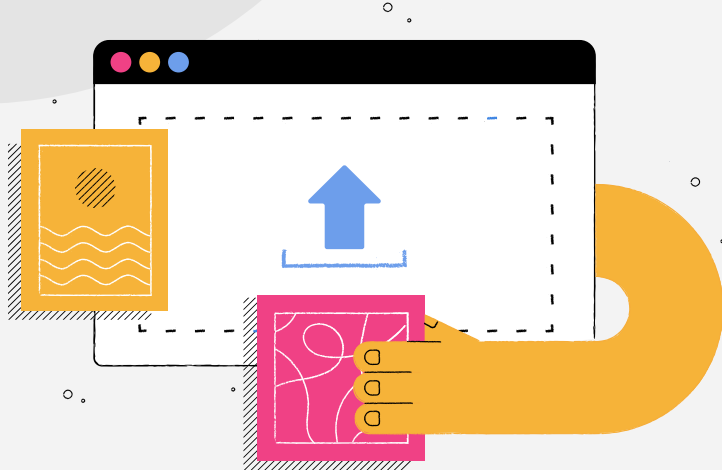
SUMMARY
